- 2022–23 Grants and Accounts: Analyzed and Balanced.
- 2022-23 Projected Deficit of \$700,000
 Debt Stabilization Fund will be debited leaving \$2,513,945 in Debt Stabilization fund.
 - The previous projection was \$1,000,000
 - The projected deficit includes a \$500,000 transfer to the Capital Reserve Fund.

2022-2023 Fund Balance Wrap-Up

Unassigned Fund Balance should be 5-8% of expenditures, 2021-2022 CVSD projected is 4%

Capital Reserve is dangerously low for a District our size

Capital Reserve is needed for:

- Unforeseen emergencies
- Planned capital projects (IS Roof or Renovation)
- Bus/van replacements
- Capital equipment replacement



2022-2023 Food Service Update \$42,077 Profit

- Must stay in Food Service
- The food service balance cannot exceed 3 months of operating cost
- In 2022-23
 - Updated lighting in HS food service line
 - Applied wraps on equipment at PS and HS to update
 - Updated point of service software and hardware
- New Regional Manager, Kelly Patterson

2023-24 Budget Update

<u>State Revenue</u>

Good News! Basic Ed and Special Ed Funding came in higher than budgeted +\$677,664

- Basic Ed Funding \$605,028
- Special Ed Funding \$ 72,636

2023-24 Budget Impact to Date

Student numbers are higher in some areas

- Increase in special education students 25 new enrollments
- Increase in EL students 75 new enrollments
- Increase in elementary students leading to Long Term Substitute Teachers in Kindergarten and Grade 1
 - K 300, 305 in 2022-23; still enrolling
 - 1st 314, 308 in 2022-23, 305 moved up from last year



2023-24 Budget Update

Special Education

16% increase in students with disabilities in the last 5 years

43 out-of-district placements,

• District has not placed any students in outside placements for two years

\$ 2,581,304

\$ 9,672,013

- However, in 2023-24, 5 students moved into the district with out-of-district placements already in their IEP
- 2023–24 Special Education Budget \$12,253,317
 - State and federal funding
 - Local funding

<u>English Learners</u>

- 22% growth since August 2023
- 30% growth since 2022-23
- 277% growth in the last ten years
- 100% local funding supported; no state and federal subsidy for the EL



District Bond Issue Update - \$17M Construction

<u>Athletics</u>

- Exterior Renovation of stadium including lights, bleacher, track, turf, press box, and entrance Spent to date: \$1,069,973 out of \$6,087,912
- Interior Renovation of gymnasium, pool, and stage. Tentative budget: \$6,950,383 Discussion and rebid will be necessary at a future date

<u>Update on Allegheny County Common Level Ratio (CLR) Litigation</u>

- Legal case challenging the Common Level Ratio (CLR)
- September 1, 2022 Judge Hertzberg issued Court Order lowering the 2021 CLR from 81.1% to 63.53%
- Court Order also requires Allegheny County to immediately submit its sales data to the State Tax Equalization Board (STEB) for an official recalculation of the 2022 CLR.
- CLR of <u>63.53% or lower</u> will be used in appeals cases from July 1, 2023 to June 30, 2024.
- More appeals expected; potential annual revenue loss of (\$455,000) Judge Hertzberg has yet to rule on future years being included which will further impact our budget.
